### Global

Another global record was set on Thursday, with daily new infections logged at 741,871; the daily death toll hovers at record highs.

- The IMF's steering committee chose Swedish Finance Minister Magdalena Andersson as chair, the first European in the role for over 12 years.
- The WHO called for "concerted action" to invest in mental health services, warning of a growing crisis in Europe ahead of the end-ofyear festive season.

- A Singapore study finds babies born to Covid-19 mothers have antibodies.
- A review of data from more than 89,500 coronavirus patients hospitalized in France between March 1 and April 30 found that the virus killed critically ill people at a rate three times higher than the influenza virus.



### **COVID-19 Vaccine**

## Pfizer denied reports that it is having production problems, saying it has millions of vaccine doses ready to deliver.

- The US FDA's advisory panel endorsed Moderna's COVID-19 vaccine, paving the way for emergency use authorization. Moderna plans to offer trial participants who received placebo shots an early opportunity for the real vaccine.
- The EU says it plans to start vaccinations as soon as December 27.
- Nikkei reported that Pfizer will apply for regulatory approval in Japan today.
- Hungary will start vaccinating healthcare workers against Covid-19 as soon as December 27.

- Johnson & Johnson has enrolled about 45,000
   participants for the first late-stage trial of its COVID-19
   single-dose vaccine candidate and expects interim data
   by late-January, with plans to submit an emergency use
   authorization application to the US FDA in February if
   the data from the study is safe and effective.
- Vendors were offering coronavirus vaccines for sale on the dark web days after the first Covid-19 shot was approved this month, as criminals seek to profit from global demand for inoculations.
- Oxford University's COVID-19 **vaccine candidate** has a better immune response when a two full-dose regime is used rather than a full-dose followed by a half-dose booster, according to data from early trials.



### **Markets**

Foreign investors have piled into emerging markets this quarter at the most rapid clip in seven years, offsetting a record exodus from those countries' stock and bond markets at the start of the coronavirus crisis.

- European shares were mixed early on Friday, with investors on edge over a Brexit trade deal and US stimulus package.
- Asian shares were also mixed on Friday.
- US stocks closed at fresh records Thursday on optimism over Congressional stimulus talks.
- The Bank of England decided Thursday to keep its monetary policy unchanged, citing an "unusually uncertain" economic outlook.

- Robinhood agreed to pay \$65 million to settle an
   SEC probe over its failure to disclose business deals with high-speed trading firms.
- Oil prices hit a nine-month high Thursday on US stimulus optimism.
- **Copper**, the world's most important industrial metal, reached a seven-year high of \$8,000 a ton on Friday having climbed more than 70 percent from its March lows in recent months.



### Business

# A further antitrust lawsuit joined by 38 states targeted Google on Thursday.

- In the three months leading to November, FedEx
  revenues hit a quarterly record in another demonstration
  of the pandemic's shipping boom.
- **Coca-Cola** is cutting 2,200 jobs worldwide as the closure of bars, restaurants, and other venues continue to batter its revenue.
- Twitter is planning to create a label for automated "bot" accounts.
- US-based coatings maker PPG Industries has made an offer to buy Finnish paint producer Tikkurila for a total of 1.1 billion euros (\$1.35 billion).

- Indonesia's **Tokopedia** is lining up an IPO worth at least \$1 billion next year, in what could be the biggest overseas listing by a Southeast Asian start-up.
- Dutch health technology company Philips is set to buy US cardiac diagnostics and monitoring firm BioTelemetry in a \$2.8 billion deal that will strengthen its offering of remote care products.
- Canada's BlackBerry Ltd, missed Wall Street estimates for third-quarter revenue on Thursday, hit by poor demand for its cybersecurity products and QNX car software.



### **Africa**

Hundreds of schoolboys who were kidnapped in northwest Nigeria
last week have been freed, according to Katsina state's governor.

 Netflix named its first African member of its board of directors, famous Zimbabwe billionaire Strive Masiyiwa.

• French MPs voted to return prized artifacts looted during colonial times to Benin and Senegal.

• **Mozambique's** President Nyusi said he will pardon all prisoners who have served at least half their sentences and shown "exemplary behavior."

 Police in Ghana used a water cannon to disperse crowds protesting the result of the recent presidential election.

• **Ethiopia** is offering a 10 million birr (\$260,000) reward to anyone with information on the location of fugitive leaders of the rebellious force in the northern region of Tigray.







### Asia

 Medical facilities in Japan are struggling to attract enough skilled nurses as they face a surge in COVID-19 patients. Japan reported a record-breaking 3,199 new daily cases.

Vietnam began human trials of its COVID-19 vaccine Nanocovax.
 At least 15 sailors are missing after a Panama-flagged cargo ship capsized off the coast of Vietnam.

• Eight more prominent **Hong Kong** democracy activists were arrested Thursday for taking part in an "*illegal assembly*" one day after the national security law was implemented. **China** firmly opposes the US "*smearing China without evidence*," in response to Washington banning utilities that supply electricity to **US** defense facilities from buying power grid equipment from China. China will impose anti-dumping duties on a rubber product from the US, **South Korea** and the **EU** starting December 20.

 Indonesian health officials urged regions with extra testing capacity to save resources, as the country will be "in this war for a long time."



## Europe

- Brexit talks hit a fresh hurdle over the consideration of the EU's €750bn recovery fund under state-aid restrictions.
- The EU's insurance regulator launched changes to its Solvency II insurance regime.
- Greece announced tighter lockdown restrictions in western Attica, a region around Athens, as cases continue to increase. Poland will enter a new lockdown from December 28-January 17, as the health minister cautioned that the impact of vaccinations would not be felt this winter. Portugal's and Spain's prime ministers tested negative for COVID-19 after being in contact with French President Macron. Czechia surpassed 600,000 infections and 10,000 virus-related deaths.
- Russian President Putin confirmed a report that intelligence agents followed Alexei Navalny but denied Kremlin
  involvement in his poisoning. Russia received a four-year ban from global sporting events by the World Anti-Doping
  Agency, which could impact the next two Olympic games.
- Turkey said it would not reverse its purchase of Russian S-400s and is exploring reciprocal steps to US sanctions.



### Middle East

The UN warned that half of all Yemenis could go hungry within a year, and that 50,000 already face hunger and famine.

 Saudi Arabia's King Salman spoke with US President Trump on regional security issues and the Gulf rift.

- A leaked draft of Iraq's state budget drove panic in the country, signaling intentions to cut salaries and devalue the Iraqi dinar.
- IAEA chief Rafael Grossi said that a new agreement on Iran's compliance breaches would have to be reached to revive any Iran nuclear deal.
- Turkey has evacuated seven military observation posts in northwest Syria, pulling back troops from territory controlled by the Syrian government to areas held by insurgents and Turkeybacked rebels.



## **Americas**

 The International Labor Organization said that unemployment in Latin America and the Caribbean will reach its highest level in over a decade this year at 10.6 percent.

• Mexico's central bank left interest rates steady at 4.25 percent in its final meeting of 2020. Mexico's government announced that the country's minimum wage would rise by 15 percent in January to the equivalent of \$7 per day. Mexican President Obrador defended his country's restrictive migration policy, which have prevented many Central American migrants from entering Mexico in transit to the US. Two Mexican environmental organizations filed a petition on Thursday under the new North American trade agreement for the protection of endangered sea turtles after what it called a failure by the Mexican government to prevent their deaths.

 Daily COVID-19 deaths in Brazil rose to 1,092, the highest in over three months. Brazilian government data showed that almost half of Brazil's 1.8m child laborers work in dangerous conditions.

- **Trinidad and Tobago** said it would impose stiffer penalties on those trafficking migrants from neighboring **Venezuela**, days after a Venezuelan boat headed to the Caribbean nation sank, killing at least 28 people.
- A Canadian cabinet member floated the idea of a North American ban on sales of new gas-powered cars, calling for better environmental policy coordination with the US.



### **Americas: US**


- Surpassing 17 million cases, the nation reported over 240,000 new cases and 3,000 deaths. California again reported very high numbers of new cases and deaths. There are no empty ICU beds in South California. San Francisco on Thursday announced a mandatory quarantine of 10 days for anyone coming into the city from outside the Bay Area.
   Arizona recorded a record high number of COVID-19 hospitalizations. New York reached hospitalization levels not seen since May.
- The FDA is investigating a small number of allergic reactions to the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine, but the agency said Thursday that
  distribution of the vaccination should continue without restrictions. Employers can legally require workers to get the coronavirus vaccine
  before returning to the office, the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission ruled. US laboratories are finding fewer cases of the flu, as
  COVID-19 precautions appear to be curbing flu transmission.
- **President-elect Biden** plans to nominate North Carolina environmental regulator Michael Regan to head the EPA and Rep. Deb Haaland as Interior secretary. President-elect Biden tested negative for COVID-19 after one of his aides tested positive.
- More than 81,000 deaths from **drug overdose** occurred in the US in the 12 months ending May 2020, according to the CDC, the highest number of overdose deaths recorded in the country in a 12-month period. New weekly **jobless claims** surged to 885,000.
- The Administration is set to add dozens of **Chinese** companies, including the country's top chipmaker SMIC, to a trade blacklist on Friday.
- US cyber officials warned that the major **cyber-attack** discovered this week still poses a "grave risk" to the country, threatening critical infrastructure and the private sector. The National Security Agency issued a rare "cybersecurity advisory" detailing how certain Microsoft Azure cloud services may have been compromised by hackers and directing users to lock down their systems. Politico reported that hackers also gained access to US nuclear networks.






### **Americas: US**

### Vaccine Update: Russia's Sputnik V

On August 11, Russia became the first country to register a vaccine for widespread early use, dubbing its new development "Sputnik V." Though the vaccine's approval was criticized internationally as premature and possibly dangerous, and though widespread vaccinations began many months after initially promised, Sputnik V has emerged as a leading international COVID-19 vaccine. According to the head of Russia's sovereign wealth fund, the Russian Direct Investment Fund (RDIF) - which funded the development of Sputnik V - over 200,000 Russians have already received the shot, and millions more doses have been promised around the world.

The new and relatively untested nature of the technology has raised Developed by the Gamaleya Research Institute of Epidemiology and Microbiology and initially named "Gam-COVID-Vac," Sputnik V uses a combination of adenoviruses, similar to the base technology of AstraZeneca and Oxford University's vaccine. In fact, on December 11 Sputnik V's developers announced a collaboration with AstraZeneca, which will trial combining its own experimental vaccine with Sputnik V. Sputnik V claims to be 91.4 percent effective against COVID-19, an efficacy rate first described in November and reiterated by the vaccine's developers just this week, based on new clinical trial results.

However, some international scientists continue to raise questions about the vaccine's safety, raising issues with data transparency and incomplete late-stage trials.

#### Vaccine Distribution within Russia

Though Sputnik V was initially registered in August, large-scale vaccinations only began this month, with President Putin ordering the start of a widespread voluntary vaccination program early this month. However, Russia's health minister said at the beginning of December that more than 100,000 have already received the shot, some 40,000

of whom are in trials around the world and another approximately 60.000 medical and other frontline workers who were inoculated before the general public. For the rest of the public, over 300,000 doses have been distributed to vaccination clinics according to the Gamaleya Institute. In an interview on December 4, RDIF head Kirill Dmitriev said he expects 2 million people to be vaccinated before the end of the year, a number that has been echoed by President Putin. The vaccine will be free for all Russian citizens, though it is unclear how many Russians will be willing to voluntarily seek a vaccine. Polls cited by Moscow's mayor in September showed that half of Russians have doubts about the vaccine. However, as clinical trials progress, further data is published in peer-reviewed platforms, and no severe side effects have emerged in the months since Sputnik V's initial approval, some early worries may have faded. The head of the Gamaleya Institute has expressed confidence that Russia will vaccinate its entire population in 2021.

#### Sputnik V's International Deals

No international health regulators have yet approved Sputnik V, but many countries have made deals for doses of the vaccine should it

prove safe. According to Duke University's Global Health Innovation Center, Gamaleya has deals to provide 100 million doses for India, 50 million for Brazil, 32 million for Mexico, 25 million for Egypt, 25 million for Argentina, 35 million for Uzbekistan, 25 million for Nepal, 10 million for Venezuela, 2 million for Kazakhstan and an unknown amount to both Saudi Arabia and Vietnam. Like Pfizer's vaccine, Sputnik V requires two doses, administered three weeks apart. For international buyers, a two-dose regimen will be priced at under \$20. According to Sputnik V's official website, a total of over 30 countries have expressed interest in the vaccine, including the UAE, Indonesia, and the Philippines in addition to the countries listed by Duke. Many of the countries with purchase agreements also have hosted Sputnik V clinical trials, such as India, Venezuela, Brazil and Egypt. Sputnik V's developers have also described mass production partnerships with India, South Korea, Brazil, China, Saudi Arabia and Turkey. RDIF's Dmitriev expects over 1 billion doses to be produced outside of Russia in 2021.





### State of the Transition: Electoral College Votes and More Appointments

## This Monday, the Electoral College met in their respective state capitals and cast their votes for president. As expected, the final count was 306 to 232, in favor of President-elect Joe Biden.

Unlike in 2016, there were no "unfaithful" electors, meaning that all pledged electoral college votes went to the appropriate candidate. The final vote on Monday prompted Majority Leader Mitch McConnell to congratulate President-elect Biden and Vice President-elect Kamala Harris on the floor of the Senate, which has led to additional Republican members of Congress to publically do the same. There remains a significant minority of Republicans who have plans to object to Congress's certification of the Electoral College vote on January 6, despite GOP leadership attempts to quash any dissent. Reporting indicates that Vice President Mike Pence intends to confirm the Congressional certification in his role as President of the Senate, and then immediately leave Washington DC on a diplomatic visit to the Middle East and Europe, most likely to Israel and Poland.

President-elect Biden continues to announce appointments to cabinetlevel positions. After initially announcing his national security team, the former vice president has now moved on to domestic policy picks, including head of Department of Transportation (Mayor Pete Buttigieg), Department of the Interior (Congresswoman Deb Haaland), Department of Energy (Former Governor of Michigan Jennifer Granholm), and Environmental Protection Agency (Michael Regan, North Carolina's top environmental regulator). In making these picks, Biden has sought to keep his campaign promise of appointing a cabinet "that looks like America" and having the most diverse Administration in US history. Buttigieg, a former Democratic primary rival, will be the first LGBTQ+ cabinet appointment sent to the Senate for confirmation. Congresswoman Haaland will make history as the first Native American to lead the Department of the Interior. If confirmed, former General Lloyd Austin will be the first African American to lead the Pentagon, and Janet Yellen would become the first female Treasury Secretary.





### State of the Transition: Electoral College Votes and More Appointments

The remaining unfulfilled cabinet posts include future leadership of the Departments of Commerce, Education, Labor, the Justice Department, Small Business Administration and the CIA. Biden is reported to be more closely coordinating with Congress on these appointments, given that several have caught leadership by surprise when announced, as well as the Democratic Party's narrow majority in the House of Representatives.

In addition to the COVID-19 pandemic, the incoming Biden Administration is already being confronted with several international crises, despite not taking office until January 20, 2021. Revelations over the last several days of a large-scale cyber-attack on the US government has prompted the President-elect's transition team to pledge counteractions, stating that the administration will impose "substantial costs on those responsible for such malicious attacks." Reports have attributed the cyber operations to Russian state hackers, which targeted the nation's critical digital infrastructure,


private sector, as well as numerous government agencies. In Congress, n legislative stalemate threatens fragile economic recovery as the government heads towards a shutdown without passing stimulus relief measures. Finally, Pfizer announced on Thursday that the company has millions more doses of the COVID-19 vaccine that have not been distributed, partially due to confusion in the logistics of Operation Warp Speed. A press release from the pharmaceutical giant states that "we have not received any shipment instructions for [the] additional doses." After a several week delay in the formal certification of the election results, the incoming Biden Administration is now closely coordinating with the Trump Administration in responding to these numerous crises.




