WHAT WE'RE WATCHING

The final vote count in **El Salvador**'s midterm election will begin today and President Nayib Bukele's party and its allies are likely to win a congressional supermajority. The 39-year-old president will have free rein to remake the country's judiciary and the power to enact constitutional changes without opposition lawmakers, adding to concerns about rising authoritarianism in the country.







Global

Confirmed coronavirus cases globally surpassed 114.4 million, with deaths at 2.5 million.

- The number of global daily new cases have reversed course, now increasing, a sign that circulating variants and premature efforts to lift public health restrictions are eroding mitigation successes.
- A new international study found that the Brazilian coronavirus variant P.1, which has spread to over 25 countries, is about twice as transmissible as some other strains and more resistant to the natural immunity developed after contracting COVID-19.
- WHO investigators are skeptical of a Chinese theory that coronavirus was brought to Wuhan through frozen food, calling it "extremely unlikely."
- Three North American companies are setting up a rare earths supply chain to reduce the West's dependence on China for the vital metals used in weapons, electric vehicles and other advanced technology. The companies have developed an efficient way to safely produce rare earths from radioactive monazite sands.



COVID-19 Vaccine

Novavax expects to file for its COVID-19 vaccine approval in the UK and US in Q2.

- Johnson & Johnson vaccines are on track to see their first use in the US today. The US may prioritize their use in harder-hit, difficult-to-reach areas.
- Canada's National Advisory Committee advised against
 the use of Oxford-AstraZeneca vaccines for people
 over 65. France is to expand its use of the
 Oxford/AstraZeneca vaccine after additional clinical data
 proved its efficacy among people aged over 65.
 Germany is also expected to reverse its decision to
 restrict the vaccine's use based on age.
- Australia has given the first dose of vaccines to almost 42,000 residents more than a week into its inoculation program.
- The Philippines began its vaccination campaign.
- Syria began vaccinating at-risk frontline healthcare workers, per state media, likely with the Russian Sputnik V vaccine.
- The Ivory Coast began its vaccination drive, using doses supplied by Covax.



Chile plans to increase its purchases of Sinovac vaccine.

Nicaragua will begin vaccinations today, using the Sputnik V vaccine.







Markets & Business

Volvo announced plans for its entire car lineup to be fully electric by 2030.

- **European shares** were flat on Tuesday as investors wait for the bond market's next move.
- Equities across Asia-Pacific fell after China's banking regulator voiced concerns over bubbles in foreign markets.
- US stocks rallied Monday in their biggest one-day rise since June.
- Royal Caribbean launched a \$1.5 billion stock offering as the company seeks to raise more funds.
- Zoom's strong quarterly performance and upbeat forecast for the year ahead indicate lasting demand for videoconferencing.

- Paris-based **DPD** became the latest global delivery business to log a surge in demand, delivering an average 7.5 million parcels every day in 2020.
- Exxon Mobil added two new directors to its board Monday amid pressure from activist investors.
- **Twitter** is expanding its use of enforcement tools against users who spread misinformation about COVID-19.
- Engineering companies Baker Hughes and Akastor announced plans to merge their offshore oil drilling equipment units to form a global company serving the energy industry.

Africa

Nigerien opposition politician Hama Amadou was arrested on charges including complicity with property destruction amid protests over
 Niger's recent runoff elections.

- Gunmen have freed all 279 girls kidnapped from a boarding school in northwest Nigeria. Jihadists linked to the Islamic State have attacked a UN base and overrun a humanitarian hub in Nigeria, trapping 25 aid workers.
- Chadian opposition politician and former rebel leader Yaya Dillo fled his home after an attempt to arrest him led to a five-day armed standoff.
- Zimbabwe's Vice President Kembo Mohadi resigned amid sexual misconduct allegations.





Asia

 India's Prime Minister Modi received a COVID-19 vaccine in a bid to boost vaccine confidence as the country began inoculating over-60s.

 The Japanese government requested that Beijing stop performing anal swab tests for COVID-19 on Japanese citizens, saying the testing method causes psychological pain.

 Exiled Cambodian opposition figure Sam Rainsy was sentenced in absentia to 25 years in prison for an alleged plan to overthrow the Hun Sen government.

• The **Chinese** PLA began a month-long military exercise in the South China Sea Monday, aimed at bolstering military modernization.

Myanmar police used stun grenades on Tuesday to disperse protestors. Hundreds of protesters, many wearing hard hats, gathered behind barricades in Yangon to chant slogans against military rule. In a video conference call between ASEAN leaders and a representative of Myanmar's junta today, the regional body will express concern about the growing violence and encourage dialogue between Suu Kyi and the generals.

Indonesia has detected two cases of the more infectious COVID-19 variant first discovered in Britain.



Europe

 European Commission President Von der Leyen discussed a planned EU "Digital Green Passport" on Monday, which could boost travel in the EU by certifying the immunization; a proposal will be announced this month.

- Increasingly, European countries are taking divergent approaches to securing vaccine supplies: Austria and
 Denmark are planning a "vaccine alliance" with Israel, Slovakia announced purchase of 2 million Russian
 Sputnik V vaccines, and Polish President Duda discussed purchasing Chinese vaccines on a call with Chinese President Xi on Monday.
- The **Czech Republic**, facing a surge in new infections, deployed more police officers and soldiers to help enforce new lockdown measures that seek to confine people mostly to their home districts.
- Former **French** president Nicolas Sarkozy has been sentenced to three years in prison, including two suspended, after a Paris court found him guilty of corruption and influence peddling.




Middle East

• The **US** announced that its strike in **Syria** last week killed one member of an **Iranian**-backed militia and injured at least two others.

 A US Navy ship has docked in Port Sudan on a scheduled visit a day after a Russian warship entered at the port.

A UN donor conference raised \$1.7 billion for the humanitarian crisis in Yemen, over \$2 billion short of the amount Secretary General Guterres had requested. Saudi Arabia pledged \$430 million. The US pledged \$191 million. The US called on the Houthis to "match Saudi commitment to ending Yemen war."

 The first Emirati ambassador to Israel took up his post in Tel Aviv, six months after relations were first established between the UAE and Israel.







Americas

 Argentina's President Fernandez said he did not want to rush into a new deal with the IMF.

 Brazil posted a \$1.2 billion trade surplus in February. Health officials in Brazil called for lockdowns and curfews across many parts of the country as hospital capacity is threatened by high case numbers; Brazil's capital Brasilia entered a two-week lockdown on Sunday.

- Ecuadorian officials linked last week's prison riots with organized transnational crime.
- Human Rights group Penal Forum accused Venezuela of using pretrial detention as a punishment, citing that nearly three-quarters of all individuals detained for political reasons are awaiting trial. Venezuelan fuel exports rose in February on stronger sales to Asia.



Americas: US

- Nationally, 50.7 million people (15.3 percent of the total population) have received one or more
 vaccine doses. Dr. Fauci reiterated that the US will adhere to a plan to inoculate tens of millions
 of Americans with two doses of coronavirus vaccine and not shift to a single-dose strategy to offer
 at least some protection to a greater number of people.
- Twenty-nine out of 50 states reported more **new infections** last week compared to the previous seven days, whereas only seven states in the prior week reported weekly increases; the CDC warned that states are **easing restrictions** too rapidly, risking a fourth wave. California's Gov. Newsom and legislature announced a package intended to encourage **school** districts to reopen, including \$2 billion in aid and fast-tracked vaccines for teachers.
- **US manufacturing** growth rose more than expected in February, reaching a 3-year high.
- Senate Democrats will not challenge the Senate parliamentarian's ruling that the **\$15 minimum wage** cannot be included in Biden's coronavirus aid package and will move forward with the measure without the wages bump.
- A new FEMA report lists **natural disasters** that the US is insufficiently prepared for, including a second pandemic, earthquakes, increasing hurricanes, and wildfires.
- The US is expected to impose sanctions on **Russia** for the poisoning of Kremlin critic Alexei Navalny today.



What is the Milk Tea Alliance?

Over recent weeks, as massive anti-coup protests have grown and the military government has responded with increasing violence, the world's eyes have been on Myanmar. For many international audiences, coverage of Myanmar has provided the first glimpse of the "Milk Tea Alliance," a youth-led online movement spreading prodemocracy messages across Asia. The Milk Tea Alliance is decentralized and dispersed, driven by netizens and activists from across Southeast Asia brought together by a hashtag and shared grievances against authoritarianism. From online boycotts to solidarity rallies, the Alliance's presence is growing – both on the internet and in the streets.

The Milk Tea Alliance began in April 2020, when a group of international netizens took to social media to defend prominent Thai actor Vachirawit Chivaaree, who had come under attack by Chinese accounts for posts from himself and his girlfriend that were perceived as supporting Hong Kong and Taiwanese independence. Twitter users from Hong Kong and Taiwan joined Thai counterparts in the online feud, forging the beginning of the online alliance through memes and shared social media enemies. As described in one July 2020 OZY headline, the Milk Tea Alliance became "The Asian Volunteer Army Rising Against China's Internet Trolls."

Since April, the movement has only grown, becoming a framework to amplify the messages of anti-authoritarian and anti-Chinese Communist Party (CCP) causes across the region. The hashtag #MilkTeaAlliance has been used for specific drives, like calling for a boycott of Disney's remake of Mulan, as well as to promote solidarity on an array of issues beyond China. The 2020 China-India border clashes prompted some netizens to include India in the Alliance, adding India's masala chai to milk tea memes. Renewed Thai prodemocracy protests in late summer of last year further invigorated the movement, as the #MilkTeaAlliance was heavily used by

protestors and their regional allies, and statements of solidarity with Thailand were seen across Alliance countries. Throughout the past year, the movement has also focused on Hong Kong, organizing solidarity rallies, online protest, and signals of public support for prodemocracy activists, like calling for followers to wear black in protest of their arrests.

Since the February 1 coup in Myanmar, the mobilization of the Milk Tea Alliance has drawn an increased amount of global attention, as the Alliance has organized not only online attention, but also solidarity protests in cities across Southeast Asia. Last Sunday, Milk Tea Alliance activists held rallies in Taipei, Bangkok, Melbourne, and Hong Kong, along with online rallies in Indonesia and Malaysia. #MilkTeaAlliance has promoted pro-democracy posts and footage of protests in Myanmar, especially since the violent crackdown on protestors over the past few days. On the streets of Myanmar, many protestors have carried signs invoking the Milk Tea Alliance, showing slogans like: "Drink Milk Tea. Abolish the Dictatorship. Fight for Freedom." Moreover, protestors have used tactics and imagery seen in fellow regional pro-democracy protests, like the three finger

Hunger Games salute common in Thailand's student-led movement and the yellow construction helmets that have become symbolic of Hong Kong's mass protests - signs of cross-border influence that goes beyond just the Milk Tea Alliance.

The past year has shown steady growth in the mobilizing power of the Milk Tea Alliance, rising from birth in an online meme war to become an internationally noted coalition sparking solidarity protests across the region. The true clout of the Milk Tea Alliance is difficult to measure, as it foundationally lacks formal structure or official leadership. The Myanmar solidarity rallies across Southeast Asia last Sunday were relatively small, drawing crowds in the dozens or hundreds. Chinese state-backed media has dismissed the Alliance alongside Hong Kong "secessionists" as acting under Western influence, or promoting conspiracies against China. However, there is reason to believe the Milk Tea Alliance will grow in both its influence and geographic reach. Its broad pro-democracy/antiauthoritarianism message is popular and transnational, creating an umbrella movement for issues that are at the same time specific to one national context but also fit within a core set of expansive values.





What is the Milk Tea Alliance?

One prominent unofficial Milk Tea Alliance Twitter account describes itself as promoting "pan-Asian solidarity for democracy," and Milk Tea Alliance tweets and memes sometimes invoke the idea of an "Asia Spring." The emblematic milk tea imagery of the movement can be quite loosely applied to include new groups and countries. The Australian baby formula milk product Aptamil, for example, was included in some Milk Tea Alliance memes after its call for an international investigation into COVID-19's origins prompted backlash from Beijing.

As the Milk Tea Alliance approaches the one-year anniversary of its inception, many questions surround the movement's future. If its influence and reach continue to grow, the Milk Tea Alliance could become more of a force in Asian politics, driving protest and civil disobedience against authoritarian governments, and potentially influencing policy towards China. Online power could translate into more boycott calls, impacting the reputational risk landscape for businesses and individuals operating in Asia. If such power does grow, targeted regional governments may react with increased

censorship or crackdown. The CCP could also react more strongly; given the centrality of Hong Kong and Taiwan in the Alliance, Alliance-supporters could be branded as secessionists, creating risk of falling afoul of broadly defined extra-territorial national security laws. But such actions could backfire, prompting increased support and visibility. In its essence, the Milk Tea Alliance is a shared idea - something much harder to suppress than any one activist or organization.


As of 2100 hours US EDT on March 1, 2021






