### Global Situation Update: May 10, 2021

#### WHAT WE'RE WATCHING

Today, top Israeli and South Korean ministers will meet in Seoul to sign a landmark free trade agreement. The deal is Israel's first with an East Asian country and will cut out customs duties on bilateral trade and offer safety nets on investments for both sides.

In 2020, Israel-South Korea trade reached approximately \$2.4 billion, with two thirds of goods and services imported into Israel. The free trade agreement will lower the cost of Korean cars, cell phones and other products for Israeli consumers. Israel is also working on a free trade agreement with China, Vietnam and other Asian nations.







### Global

Athletes from the US and the U.K. came to Tokyo for a track and field competition over the weekend that served as an on-site test for a pandemic-constrained Olympics. The athletes were restricted to movements between their lodgings and the National Stadium, which was empty except for staff.


 Eli Lilly and Co announced it had signed licensing agreements with three Indian generic drugmakers to expand the availability of its arthritis drug baricitinib in the country for treating COVID-19 patients.



### Global

Confirmed coronavirus infections topped 158.2 million with more than 3.2 million deaths.

The current surge in new cases appears to be easing, with India showing signs of peaking.





### **COVID-19 Vaccine**

South African President Ramaphosa said that if wealthy nations hogged COVID-19 shots while millions in poor countries died waiting for them, it would amount to "vaccine apartheid."

- The WHO added Sinopharm's vaccine to its list of approved COVID-19 vaccines, boosting the credentials of the Chinese company.
- The Indian variant of COVID-19 with its double mutation has been discovered in at least 18 countries, including Bangladesh, Sri Lanka, Singapore, Japan, New Zealand, Uganda, Kenya, US, UK, Greece and France.
- Sri Lanka on Saturday approved Pfizer's COVID-19
   vaccine for emergency use in Sri Lanka, as the
   island nation battles a third wave of the virus.
- Germany's federal and regional governments have decided that the Johnson & Johnson vaccine should be given largely to Germans aged 60 and over.
- An expert panel in Norway recommended that both the Oxford/AstraZeneca and Johnson & Johnson vaccines not be used in the Scandinavian country.



### Markets & Business

Oil prices rose after a cyber-attack shut down a US pipeline operator that provides nearly half of the US east coast's fuel supply.

- World stocks edged up to new peaks on Monday on bets interest rates will remain low and the economy continue its recovery.
- The Dutch government has granted a consortium that includes oil majors Royal Dutch Shell and ExxonMobil around 2 billion euros (\$2.4 billion) in subsidies for what is set to become one of the largest carbon capture and storage (CCS) projects in the world.
- BioNTech plans to set up headquarters for southeast Asia in Singapore, in what it says is a first step to expand operations in the region.
- Colorado oil-and-gas producers Bonanza Creek
   Energy Inc. and Extraction Oil & Gas Inc.
   announced plans to combine into a new company
   valued at about \$2.3 billion.



### **Africa**

 Algeria plans to bar any protests that do not have prior approval, in an attempt to end weekly mass demonstrations that ousted a veteran president in 2019 but have continued to demand a more thorough purge of the ruling elite.

• **South Sudan's** President Salva Kiir has dissolved parliament, the next step in the peace agreement to end the civil war, paving the way for the appointment of lawmakers from formerly warring parties in the country.

- Chad's military claimed victory on Sunday in its weeks-long battle with northern rebels that led to the death of President Idriss Deby on the battlefield.
- Armed attackers killed six people at a police station in southern Nigeria, bringing the
  total number of officers killed over the weekend to 12 amid escalating violence
  nationwide. The killings followed three attacks on Friday night in the southern oil hub of
  Rivers state.



### Asia

Myanmar's ruling junta suspended more than 11,000 academics and other university staff after going on strike in protest against military rule.

India is mobilizing hundreds of former army medics to support its
overwhelmed healthcare system. Over the weekend, India surpassed
22 million infections and continued to report over 400,000 daily new cases.
Calls grew for India to impose a nationwide lockdown.


Remnants of China's biggest rocket landed in the Indian Ocean on Sunday, with
most of its components destroyed upon re-entry into the atmosphere, ending days of speculation
over where the debris would hit. China has urged UN member states not to attend a virtual event
planned next week by Germany, the United States and Britain on the repression of Uyghur Muslims
and other minorities in Xinjiang.

• **Taiwan** ordered all pilots of its national airline to undergo 14 days of quarantine, as health authorities scramble to prevent an outbreak of COVID-19 among the carrier's crews from spilling over into the community.



## Europe

The boost to Europe's economy from as much as €800bn of EU funding over the next five years is on track to help the region rebound close to its pre-crisis growth path, according to economists. Sentiment among eurozone investors has surged to its highest level in more than three years.





• Spain lifted its lockdown and young people flocked to the streets in in "freedom fiestas." Turkey surpassed 5 million infections.

Poland's death toll topped 70,000. Around 20 people in France have been currently detected with the variant of COVID-19 first found in India per French health officials. Russia is struggling with labor shortages after border closures sharply reduced the traditional cross-border migration flows from central Asia. Authorities in Greece said that the reopening from May 17 of outdoor sports facilities, apply only to vaccinated citizens.





### Middle East

 In the UAE, Dubai's economic recovery is accelerating towards pre-pandemic levels on "marked increases in output" and new business within the tourism sector in April, a survey found.

The death toll from a bomb attack outside a school in the Afghan capital Kabul
has risen to 68, officials said on Sunday, with doctors struggling to care for
165 injured victims, mostly schoolgirls. The neighborhood is home to a large
community of Shi'ites from the Hazara ethnic minority which has been targeted in
the past by Islamic State.

Violence in Jerusalem continued on Islam's holy night of Laylat al-Qadr and Jerusalem
Day, as Palestinians protested against the Israeli occupation. The Israeli government
postponed a planned hearing on evictions of Palestinians in the Sheikh Jarrah neighborhood. Jordan urged Israel to stop what it
described as "barbaric" attacks on worshippers in Jerusalem's al Agsa mosque.

• The **US** Navy's Fifth Fleet said it seized an illicit shipment of weapons from a stateless dhow in international water of the North **Arabian Sea** on May 6-7; the weapons cache included dozens of advanced Russian-made anti-tank guided missiles, thousands of Chinese Type 56 assault rifles, and hundreds of PKM machine guns, sniper rifles and rocket-propelled grenades launchers. Other weapon components included advanced optical sights.

### **Americas**

Rail line operators are re-establishing a train system to carry Bolivian
exports to Chile's Pacific ports for the first time in 16 years, holding out
hope of an increase in regional trade.

Colombia surpassed 3 million infections. On a per-capita basis,
 Colombia, with a population of 50 million, is reporting considerably more cases and deaths per day than India; it and Peru, Argentina, Brazil and Uruguay currently have among the highest death rates in the world.

 Canada shed more than 200,000 jobs last month in industries such as retail and hospitality and leisure that are affected by COVID-19 restrictions. Employment fell by 207,000 in April, while the jobless rate rose 0.6 percentage points to 8.1 percent.





### **Americas: US**

Across the nation, 152.1 million people have received at least **one dose of vaccine**, representing 45.8 percent of the total population. Top advisor Dr. Fauci said the US must become more liberal about mask wearing as the vaccination rate increases, suggesting rules for the wearing of masks indoors could be relaxed for the vaccinated.

New York City's COVID-19 positivity rate has fallen to 2.41 per cent, the lowest level in six months, with restaurants, bars and personal care businesses expanding capacity to 75 percent this week. Republican governors in Arkansas, Montana and South Carolina are starting to cut jobless benefits in their states, hoping that the loss of generous federal aid might force more people to try to return to work.

- US lenders expect mortgage demand to cool in the coming months for the **housing market**, the result of rising interest rates that make refinancing less attractive for many borrowers.
- A cyber-attack on US fuel pipeline operator Colonial Pipeline on Sunday forced the company to shut a critical fuel network supplying populous eastern states. Colonial transports roughly 2.5 million barrels per day of gasoline and other fuels from refiners on the Gulf Coast to consumers in the mid-Atlantic and southeastern United States.

### **Vaccine Update: The Halting Progress of Covax**

"As Covax seeks to move beyond its initial goals of ensuring vaccines for all global health workers to immunizing populations more broadly, it still faces serious constraints on supply, exacerbated by recent export restrictions from India."

The Covax facility was designed precisely to prevent the type of global vaccine rollout that is now occurring, in which richer countries buy up global stocks to fully vaccinate their populations while lower-income countries struggle for supplies to immunize vulnerable groups. From its onset, Covax faced hurdles from lack of buy-in and difficulty acquiring supplies amid a competitive group of national buyers. As the facility has now turned to actually distributing vaccines across the world, obstacles only continue to appear. Covax has successfully delivered vaccines across underserved jurisdictions, but it has only shipped 54 million shots total to its 121 participating countries - a drop in a bucket compared to countries like the US, which has

delivered about four times as many doses domestically. As Covax seeks to move beyond its initial goals of ensuring vaccines for all global health workers to immunizing populations more broadly, it still faces serious constraints on supply, exacerbated by recent export restrictions from India.

Thus far, Indian-produced doses of the AstraZeneca shot have made up the bulk of Covax deliveries. Of the first 49 million doses distributed through Covax, 29 million came from the Serum Institute of India, the world's largest vaccine maker. Since India began restricting vaccine exports in March to address its accelerating national outbreak, supplies have been curtailed for both Covax

and other low-income nations that had dealt bilaterally with the Serum Institute – such as Nepal, which received only half of its vaccine order due to export restrictions and may soon be facing disastrous levels of COVID-19. While Gavi had argued in early April that the Serum Institute was still legally bound to send shots to Covax, the halt in Indian exports has contributed significantly to a 90 million-dose shortfall in Covax supplies with no end in sight for Indian export controls. The Serum Institute has said that export restrictions could end in June, but this will depend on the status of India's national outbreak. In the meantime, health experts like Andrea Taylor of the Duke University's Global Health Innovation Center warn that continued lack of Indian exports could prove "devastating" for poorer countries, because "there is no contingency plan or alternative supplier for the next few months."

The shortfalls in Covax delivery can be seen acutely in Africa, where only about 1% of the continent's population has received one dose of a COVID-19 vaccine. With many African nations disproportionately reliant on Covax, rather than bilateral deals or donations, the slow pace of Covax deliveries is particularly apparent in low overall vaccination numbers. Along with supply constraints, a

number of African nations have faced issues related to the AstraZeneca vaccine, which has made up most of Covax shipments so far. The health concerns about blood clots that have been prominently covered across Europe and Asia are also impacting vaccine hesitancy in Africa; the Democratic Republic of Congo, which has documented high overall levels of vaccine skepticism, actually returned 1.2 million doses of AstraZeneca vaccine to Covax after deciding against its use. In South Africa, the AstraZeneca shot faces efficacy concerns, as evidence from one study showed that the shot is not very effective against the variant that was first discovered in South Africa, B. 1.351 and has not spread widely across the country and region. While officials at the African CDC have spoken out against the selective use of vaccines, saying benefits still outweigh risks, the challenges facing the AstraZeneca shot specifically weigh on the regional rollout more broadly.

Though Covax will continue to face headwinds in its ambitious goals of global vaccination, there are reasons to hope that the initiative will gain momentum with time. Recent moves by western nations including the US and France to back temporary waivers for intellectual property (IP) rights of COVID-19 vaccines shows

support for global vaccination efforts – though the move is unlikely to have a short-term impact on supplies. Manufacture of vaccines, particularly those relying on novel technology like mRNA, is a complex process. Gavi, the vaccine alliance that is one of Covax's backers, has pointed out that Moderna announced last October that it would not enforce patents on its COVID-19 vaccines during the pandemic – and that move "has had no impact in terms of boosting global supply." Gavi and other organizations have therefore called on vaccine powerhouses like the US to support manufacturing capacity (particularly in emerging economies) in concert with sharing IP.

However, a number of other recent developments may aid Covax's supply issues. On May 3, Moderna said it would supply 34 million doses to the facility this year, and another 466 million shots in 2022. Sweden recently donated 1 million of its AstraZeneca doses to the facility. Last Friday, the WHO approved China's Sinopharm vaccine, a move which will boost available supplies for the Covax facility. Statements from Gavi have mainly discussed the supply shortages as a short-term issue, which will hopefully subside once India

reopens exports and more vaccines become available elsewhere. Though these signs of future supply are encouraging, the near-term impact of moving slowly on global vaccinations may prove devastating. As the experiences of countries like India and Brazil demonstrate, time is a luxury that many people will not have while they wait for a vaccine.




As of 2100 hours US EDT on May 9, 2021






