Global Situation Update: May 4, 2021

WHAT WE'RE WATCHING

Today, civil unrest is expected to continue across Colombia despite the withdrawal of controversial tax reform measures by President Iván Duque. Over the past six days, tens of thousands of Colombians demonstrated against the proposed tax changes, with at least 17 people dead and more than 800 wounded.

Protests are likely to continue as citizens are mobilized and frustrated by the heavy-handed police response as well as increased poverty and unemployment brought about by pandemic lockdowns and a slow vaccine rollout.







Global

Confirmed coronavirus infections topped 153.4 million with more than 3.2 million deaths.

- According to a report by Forests & Finance, a global coalition of non-governmental organizations, Chinese banks are the second largest financers of commodities implicated in tropical rainforest deforestation, casting doubt on Beijing's ambitions to be a global leader in the fight against climate change.
- Diagnostics company Novacyt plans to donate
 COVID-19 tests to Unicef as the world
 accelerates efforts to mitigate the spread of the
 pandemic. Nigeria, Palestine, Maldives and
 South Sudan were the first four countries to
 express interest and capacity in receiving the
 test kits.



COVID-19 Vaccine

Moderna pledged to supply 34 million vaccines to the Covax initiative.

- Denmark became the first country to cut the Johnson & Johnson vaccine from its national program over blood clot safety concerns, a few weeks after dropping AstraZeneca.
- The US FDA will reportedly authorize the Pfizer vaccine for adolescents 12-15 early next week.
- Novavax will begin US trials on children aged 12-17.

Covaxin, the vaccine developed by India's
 Bharat Biotech and US biotherapeutics
 company Ocugen, appears effective against
 variants from the UK, Brazil and India, per
 study results from the Indian Council of Medical Research.





Markets & Business

Blackstone Group Inc has for the first time asked executives in companies controlled by its private equity arm to regularly report on environmental, social and governance (ESG) matters to their boards.

- Estée Lauder's CEO said the company is preparing for a "renaissance in makeup" as COVID-19 restrictions ease.
- **Fidelity** halved the valuation of **Ant Group** following the regulatory crackdown on the company.
- Saudi Aramco reported a 30 percent increase in Q1 earnings as higher oil prices as well as stronger refining and chemicals margins offset lower production.
- Apple and Epic Games, the maker of popular videogame Fortnite, gave opening arguments in a trial over Apple's App Store that could reshape the market for distributing apps on mobile devices.
- Private-equity firm Apollo Global Management has agreed to acquire Yahoo and AOL from Verizon for about \$5 billion.
- Vice Chairman Greg Abel will succeed Warren Buffet as Berkshire Hathaway's next CEO.




Africa

• The **Democratic Republic of the Congo** declared its most recent Ebola outbreak over.

 The interim president of **Chad**, son of the late President Déby, named a new transition government of 40 ministers and a few opposition figures, although most opposition politicians denounced the government.

- The World Wildlife Fund reported a serious increase in rhino poaching incidents as lockdowns have lifted in **South Africa**.
- The French prosecutor's department found that there is no basis to pursue legal claims
 against the French government for enabling the genocide in Rwanda, a month after the
 Rwandan government released a report claiming that the French government knew of
 planned killings ahead of time.







Asia

- Indonesia reported its first confirmed case of the Indian variant.
- Thailand reported a new daily record of 31 deaths.
- Nepal appealed for assistance to fill the gap of 1.6 million AstraZeneca's vaccine doses to administer second shots amid a surge in new coronavirus cases.
- Hong Kong's economy has returned to growth after six consecutive quarters of economic contraction.
- **New Zealand** Prime Minister Ardern said that her country's differences with China are becoming "harder to reconcile." New Zealand will start a travel bubble with the Cook Islands from May 17.
- **Philippines** President Duterte received his first dose of Sinopharm vaccine to encourage broader uptake. The Philippine foreign minister tweeted that **China** should "GET THE **** OUT" of the South China Sea amid an escalating maritime dispute.
- LNG imports are being diverted from India as the COVID-19 spike dampens demand. US Secretary of State Blinken promised to
 help India with its COVID-19 surge during a meeting with his counterpart External Affairs Minister Jaishankar in London. India
 surpassed 20 million infections; Indian opposition leader Gandhi called for a nationwide lockdown.

Europe

 Novavax announced plans to begin delivering vaccine doses to the EU from the end of the year. Germany is set to lift restrictions for vaccinated people as soon as this week.

- The EU signaled flexibility on easing the impact of post-Brexit trade barriers in Northern Ireland but warned that problems will continue if the UK does not align with the bloc on food safety rules.
- Immigration lawyers say that the UK has warned hundreds of asylum seekers that they may be removed to third countries in Europe.
- Voters in Madrid go to the polls today to choose the legislative assembly in **Spain's** wealthiest region in an election that could reshape the nation's political landscape.



Middle East

- Kuwait will ban unvaccinated residents from traveling abroad from May 22.
- Jordan reopened border crossings with Syria and Saudi
 Arabia that had closed 9 months ago due to coronavirus concerns.
- Libya's Foreign Minister called for the full withdrawal of all foreign fighters and mercenaries from the country.
- Israeli Prime Minister Netanyahu's mandate to form a coalition expires at midnight. If Netanyahu fails to form a coalition, President Rivlin will likely tap Yair Lapid, leader of Yesh Atid, to form a coalition next.
- France announced plans to sell Egypt 30 fighter jets in a \$4.5 billion deal.



Americas

Venezuela raised its minimum wage, a reaction to four years of hyperinflation.

Brazil is near a second contract with Pfizer to speed up its vaccination drive. A
handful of domestically developed vaccines have been submitted to health
regulators with requests to start clinical trials, as Brazil seeks to increase access
to vaccine supplies.

- **Colombia's** finance minister resigned amid continuing intense protests over a now-withdrawn tax reform proposal.
- **Trinidad and Tobago** announced tighter lockdown restrictions for three weeks starting today as the number of new COVID-19 cases hits record highs and the Caribbean nation faces a potential shortage of hospital beds.



Americas: US

- Across the nation, 147.5 million people have received at least one dose of vaccine, representing 44.4 percent of the total population. Select New Jersey breweries will offer a free beer for vaccinated residents in a new incentive program. Dr. Fauci warned that forcing drug companies to abandon intellectual property rights to COVID-19 vaccines risks backfiring if it leads to lengthy legal disputes.
- Florida Governor DeSantis signed a bill that suspends all local COVID-19 restrictions
 and bans the use of "vaccine passports," which will go into effect on July 1. New York
 Governor Cuomo announced that New York, New Jersey and Connecticut are set to
 end most COVID-19 restrictions from mid-May. Texas surpassed 2.9 million infections.
- **US manufacturing growth** lagged in April, underperforming economists' expectations amid shortages in parts and high commodities prices.
- President Biden raised the annual refugee admission cap to 62,500 after facing backlash for cancelling the increase, although he acknowledged that it is unlikely that the cap will be reached this year due to virus disruptions.



Road to Recovery: Labor Shortages in the Service Industry

As vaccinations rates continue to rise and summer approaches, optimism is generally running high around economic recovery in the United States. Restrictions on businesses are being phased out, and pent-up demand is boosting hard-hit sectors like travel and hospitality. However, the country's economic recovery is running into some unexpected hurdles, demonstrating that reopening will not be a straight line back to the pre-COVID status quo. Across the country, the hospitality sector has struggled to find staff over the past month, compounding the troubles of numerous businesses that hope to recoup steep pandemic-era losses. This worker shortage may prove just one of numerous quirks that industries will have to work through as they shift to a post-vaccine new normal.

The shortage of workers in the hospitality sector is rising to become the number one challenge for business operations in a number of restaurants and bars across the country. From just looking at the numbers, this staffing shortage may seem puzzling. The US unemployment rate is still 6%, meaning that about 9 million Americans say they are actively looking for work. And while the food service industry added over 170,000 jobs in March, the sector is still logging about 1.8 million jobs fewer than pre-pandemic levels. The issue is particularly challenging for small businesses, which have struggled the most with pandemic-related losses. According to an April Census survey, 37% of small businesses in the hospitality sectors say their operations are now being impacted by worker availability, compared to 16% of small businesses overall.

There is no simple, single explanation behind this service worker shortage, but a number of economists and business owners have pointed to broader contributing factors. Most are related to the timing of reopening, as numerous companies ramp up hiring at the same time, often pulling from the same pool of similarly skilled workers. Retail, delivery, and other service sector companies have been hiring huge numbers for months now: Amazon, for one, added 500,000 employees in 2020, paying \$15 per hour at the minimum – whereas the median food preparation worker made closer to \$13 per hour in May 2020. A shortage of foreign workers adds to staffing challenges. Last year, the Trump Administration issued a ban on temporary foreign workers as part of pandemic travel restrictions; though this lapsed on March 31, employers are worried that there is

not enough time to fill jobs by the summer with foreigners – an issue that may impact industries beyond hospitality. For some customerfacing workers like servers and bartenders, risk of COVID-19 infection remains a barrier to returning to work, even as vaccinations grow. A number of employers also say that enhanced unemployment benefits (which were extended through September) and recent stimulus checks have made it harder to attract people back to the workplace.

Though a crunch for business in the short term, the industry's reaction to this labor shortage could prove beneficial for future working conditions and wages. The restaurant industry has a checkered track record on employee satisfaction, with many businesses known for tough working conditions, poor pay and lack of job security. Now, in order to attract staff, restaurants are offering perks ranging from improved benefits to signing bonuses. One Florida McDonald's has even resorted to offering applicants \$50 just to show up to an interview, while Starr Restaurant Organization is offering \$300 signing bonuses to new hires at some restaurants in

New York and Philadelphia. Depending on how long the shortage persists, the industry may need to more deeply reassess working conditions and employee compensation to attract staff. One major unknown factor is how many former food service workers have pivoted permanently to different careers. There is extensive anecdotal evidence of servers and bartenders returning to school or entering other reskilling programs to shift careers, though numbers remain elusive. For many food service workers, sudden job losses in 2020 underscored their own lack of job security or provided the time and motivation to start down a new career path.

For the hospitality industry, the summer of 2021 certainly looks brighter than that of 2020 – even with staff shortages. Pandemic-linked factors, like fears about COVID-19 risk and immigration restrictions, are unlikely to be lasting impediments to the labor market. Moreover, the latest COVID-19 relief package included a \$28.6 billion "Restaurant Revitalization Fund" to aid the industry. But the hospitality worker shortage is just one example of unexpected road bumps on the road to economic recovery.


Supply and demand are out of balance in other parts of the economy as well, meaning that the coming months may see some surprising areas of price surges, labor shortage and other disruptions. According to analysis from Glassdoor, Google searches for job openings overall fell sharply in March, indicating that other labor market needs may go unmet. The pandemic has thrown off supply in a number of businesses – rental car companies, for example, are now facing soaring demand from domestic travelers after a year in which they sold off pieces of their fleets just to stay afloat. Like this time last year, businesses may need to show flexibility and adapt to unexpected economic developments as the country adjusts to another new normal.



Coronavirus Condition Updates


As of 2100 hours US EDT on May 3, 2021






